Preparing Students for the PARCC

Test

The PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers) test is being introduced to more than 4 million students in 36 states. This new testing is being used to measure the effectiveness of Common Core Standards in the areas of Mathematics and English/Language Arts.

What skills are needed for students to effectively take the PARCC test?

- Keyboarding Students need to have a basic knowledge of where alphabet and number keys are located.
- Basic computer skills Students need to be familiar with basic use of a mouse drag and drop, highlighting, playing a video, etc. Also, make sure the students are familiar with computer vocabulary such as cut, copy, and paste along with using delete, tab, and insert keys. Speed and accuracy are also a component of completing this test.
- Stamina The PARCC test requires students to sit for an extended amount of time typing. Make sure students are able to keep focus while sitting at the computer.
- Problem solving Have students comfortable with fixing simple technical problems such as the caps lock won't turn on, or the document froze. Stand by as a resource, but encourage the students to problem solve.

Ways to practice the above skills

- Typing games at home
- Type out responses to short answer questions, keep a journal in Word to work on stamina, getting thoughts from their head to their paper
- General exposure to a computer (not an Ipad). Let the student become familiar with where the keys are located, what each function key does, and using the mouse.
